IN MEMORY OF OUR KENYA FRIEND BISHARA

In 2006-2007 LWVGT participated in the Global Democracy project sponsored by LWVUS and the U.S. State Department. We interacted with Kenyan Muslim women on the importance of voting and civic engagement. The women came to Tucson to visit and learn, and Carol West and Sally Davenport went to Kenya to continue to work

with the women in their communities.

We have just learned that one of the most promising women who worked with us, **Bishara Abdulaziz Fadhil**, aged 48, was killed in a car accident in Kenya. She is survived by her husband Aziz and three children, all of whom were very supportive of her work. Her friend, Amina Yusuf, tribal chief and mentor, was also killed in the accident.

to speak at international conferences about women's rights. She was quick to credit her Tucson experiences for her personal growth and was considering a run in 2011 for the Mombasa City Council.

Bishara was also involved in many social service projects in her community including volunteering with the Red Cross to care for AIDS victims and getting the government to drill wells in neighborhoods so that the women would no longer have to walk for miles to obtain water for their families.

This human dynamo will be missed by all of us who knew her, but may her inspiring leadership help other Kenyan women to continue her important work.

A strong advocate for women's rights in Mombasa, Bishara led by example and taught other women about the importance of registering to vote. These women stood together in the last Kenyan election to resist bribes for votes, a common practice in Kenya.

ANNUAL MEETING 2011

On the sunny day of April 8th, members of the Greater Tucson League met at the Mountain Oyster Club to do the business of the League and get reacquainted with old and new members.

Business included the adoption of the Operating and Education Fund budgets. This included increasing the individual dues to \$75 and the household dues to \$110. Several housekeeping Bylaw changes were made. The recommended program positions were adopted. The Charter School study had been completed with consensus and this was adopted as a new position. It would be taken to the LWVAZ Board to have the local Leagues concur with this consensus.

Officers and directors elected were: 1st Vice President, Mary Gresham; 3rd Vice President, Victor Bowleg, Treasurer, Patsy Frannea; Government, Gini McGirr; and Media/Community Relations, Maxine Goodman.

Sally Davenport relayed the history of the Kenyan Project and how it has encouraged several Kenyan women to run for public office. She also explained how the League works with the Pima County Library staff in five wards with low-voter turnout.

Shirley Sandelands gave an overview of the Running & Winning project which is an effort to engage young women in understanding how they can become involved in public office and learn from those elected women who act as mentors.

Victor Bowleg reported on the many activities of the Voter Service committee from Forum Moderator training sessions, candidate and ballot issue forums and other community activities.

The luncheon panel discussion was on "Arizona's Government: The Next 100 Years." Bruce Dusenberry, Chair, Arizona Town Hall,

introduced three speakers who took part in the November, 2010 Grand Canyon Town Hall and highlighted some outcomes of that discussion. Speakers included: David Bartlett, former State Legislator; Deborah Dale and Suzanne Lawder who spoke on the importance of diversity and difference of opinion among the Town Hall participants.

The Leaguer of the Year award was presented by Shirley Sandelands, last year's recipient, to Patsy Frannea who has been the Hospitality Chair for many years. The monthly meetings participants enjoyed her culinary delights.

Gini McGirr was awarded a Lifetime Achievement Award, by President West, for her many years of dedicated service to the local, state and national levels of the LWV in Arizona and other states. President West also presented a certificate to Gordon McGirr for "Best Supporting Role" given with much appreciation for his commitment to the League.

Tokens of appreciation for their significant contribution to the work of keeping the office going were given by President West to Nina Carter, Lu Kembel, Marion Johnson, Phyllis Wassenberg and Silke Hoffmann.

The present Editorial Board members of Betty Bengtson, Gini McGirr and Betsy Zukoski were introduced and presented with a gift for their commitment in taking over the editorial duties of *The Voter* this year.

And a good time was had by all with delicious food and sparkling conversation.

Delegates from all of the six local Leagues enjoyed a wide array of convention activities. From speakers to workshops to business, the two days were packed with information. Representing the Greater Tucson League were: Carol West, Sue Ward, Trish O'Flaherty, Mary Gresham, Phylis Carnahan, Gordon McGirr and Marion Pickens. Also attending from Tucson : Shirley Sandelands, 2nd VP; Dot Boone, Treasurer and Gini McGirr, Secretary, all who are on the state Board.

Arizona Town Hall president, Tara Jackson, spoke on the timely issue of civil discourse. The Honorable Robert Brutinel, Associate Justice, AZ Supreme Court, talked on the League's on-going issue of Merit Selection and the Independence of the Judiciary.

Linda Valdez, Editorial Writer/Columnist, *The Arizona Republic*, spoke on the cost to Arizona from the passing of SB 1070 last year. Ms. Valdez was presented with the Carrie Chapman Catt award "for shedding more light than heat on the hot issue of immigration in Arizona." This award is given to a non-League member or an organization that has most exemplified the passion and strength in support of an issue of concern to the League.

Workshops were on Activism & Public Policy by John Kohl (NWMC); Social Media by Roberta Davidson (NWMC); Fundraising by Dana Johnston (NWMC), Carol West (GT) and Robyn Prud'homme-Bauer (Sedona-VV); and Membership & Leadership by Gini McGirr (GT). Elaine Wiant, LWVUS liaison, gave the workshop on "The League and Non-Partisanship in a New Era."

Delegates approved a study on the Greater Tucson Charter School consensus leading to concurrence; approved a concurrence on a change to the Legislative & Congressional Redistricting position and a concurrence to the AZ Corporation Commission position. An editorial change was made to the Election Reform position. The program positions were then adopted as a whole. These can be found on the LWVAZ website at www.lwvaz.org.

A resolution was written to be sent to the LWVUS in respect to several ads that national had on TV that were on air quality but mentioned a Democratic Senator and a Republican Senator. Members felt that the names should not have been given in the ad.

Officers/Directors elected were: President, Barbara Klein (MP); 1st VP, Robyn Prud'homme-Bauer (Sedona-VV); Secretary, Gini McGirr (GT); Development, Dana Johnston (NWMC) and Voter Editor, Roberta Davidson (NWMC).

Metro Phoenix invited the delegates to come to Phoenix for the 2012 LWVAZ Council. Members presented out-going president Bonnie Saunders with a digital picture frame. Saunders presented 1st VP Barbara Klein and Secretary Gini McGirr each with a beautiful hand crocheted antimacassar for their help in her six years of being president.

Thanks go to Bonnie Saunders and the members of NWMC for their hard work in setting up the convention and being such great hosts. And to members and guests from local Leagues across the state who devoted a lovely May weekend to League fellowship, leadership and to advancing democracy in our state.

LWV LEADERS FROM 42 STATES MEET

"The Big Picture: Anticipating the Future - The Difference is Leadership," was the theme of LWVUS Council at the National Conference Center in Leesburg, Virginia, on June 17-21. It started with a bang and held momentum through the entire conference. There were over 100 attendees from the states, Washington DC and the Virgin Islands.

The theme was introduced on Saturday morning in an exercise that laid the foundation for a state campaign plan of your choice. We chose doing a state-wide voter registration and Get-Out-The-Vote campaign.

Fundraising played a role in the conference as a successful action campaign has to be paid for. Fundraising is a result of telling your story to the funder.

Communication was another emphasized issue. The new Website, Facebook and Twitter, learning to frame issues, using the fewest and the most powerful words in alerts and getting the message out in the most effective manner. The new national website is to be up and running in the next several months. It is to be much easier to maneuver and find your way to articles or Member only material.

The message was that we must: renew membership efforts to gain and retain members and learn to recognize and use our assets much more effectively; use modern tools of communication and enlarge our contact list; use fewer, more effective words in communications; use easily remembered statistics. And use websites, Facebook, blogs, newsletters to get our message out to the public.

"Mentor" was a word heard over and over. Every member needs to learn to be a mentor which means they will need to know

the League history, processes and operations to share with others through personal relationships or conducting training sessions.

A session on storytelling brought up that each member should tell their story on the national website.

Speakers Celinda Lake, president, Lake Research Partners, and Tammy Gordon. Senior Advisor and Director of Social Communications for AARP, spoke on "The Environment We're In."

There were discussions on the new Membership and Leadership Development program as there are now 18 national coaches. By the end of 2012, all the states will be in this project. There was an evening social for all the state coaches and local League contacts. It was great to meet my coaches from Idaho, SC, TN and CA and talk to their local contacts. I was the only national Ruth Shur coach at the party.

Elisabeth McNamara, LWVUS President, presided and did a great job along with the national board members. The only business was the Advocacy Report, Treasurer's Report and the adoption of the Budget. From now on, the Budget will be for two years so will just be adopted at the national conventions.

It was a weekend filled from early morning to dinnertime and some evening sessions. One evening, the movie, "The King's Speech" was shown for members that did not want to work on their campaigns.

The national staff was available around the clock and they deserve special thanks for their work at Council. They made everything seem so easy and could answer any question.

Carol West was a delegate for LWV Greater Tucson and I was a delegate for LWVAZ and we both learned a lot at the Council and hope to pass some of it on to the local Leagues.

NEWS FROM LWVUS

PUBLIC HEALTH: LWVUS has launched a citizen's campaign to protect our public health. The Clean Air Promise offers everyone in our community a means to come together to do something for real people and for real communities. Visit www.peoplenotpolluters.org to see the ad that features real children suffering from asthma and a plea from the mother of one child that we promise to protect the health of our children. Her son suffers from asthma as a result of toxics from smokestacks at a nearby cement plant in Texas. The Clean Air Promise effort will have three components. The first one is to launch the TV ad. The second component will be a grassroots effort by the League as well as our partners in the public health and environmental community to raise awareness of the public health effects of pollution. The third component is collecting personal stories of those impacted by air pollution. The public will be directed to a League website to make the promise and share their personal experiences.

ELECTIONS: Voter Protection Project: Now that most of the state legislatures have ended their sessions, there is a clearer picture of the impact of the PAVP. The League's efforts resulted in the defeat of TWELVE Voter ID bills across the country in 2011: CO, DE, IA, ME, MO, MT, NM, NC, NH, OR and VA. Bills DID pass in AL, FL, KS, RI, S, TN, T and WI. The Ohio legislators left for summer recess WITHOUT passing the Voter ID law. They also eliminated the requirement that a voter using a Social Security number provide all nine digits instead of just the last four digits.

DEMOCRACY: Women in the Americas-Cuba: League Deputy Executive Director, Zaida Arguedas, participated in the recent Conference of Women in the XXI Century in Havana, Cuba.

Voter Service Committee members, on June 28th, volunteered and assisted Virginia Crane with Voter registration at the Broadway Proper Retirement home.

In June, a workshop was held at the South Tucson Sam Lena Library on "How to Plan a Forum". The workshop was successful and provided members of the community an opportunity to learn basic groundwork required for a forum. LIBRARY PROJECT BACK IN BUSINESS

The City of Tucson election will be mail-in balloting only-- and the League is out there helping libraries to spread the word. The LWVGT will be working with the libraries again this election to provide voting information to library goers.

In the City of Tucson election, the Mayor and Ward 1, 2 and 4 representatives on the City council will be elected. The ward representatives are nominated by vote of their ward residents only. But all voters in Tucson will be voting on all three positions in the general election. Yes, this is a different system. We haven't found any other city in the U.S. that has nomination (primaries) by Ward but at-large election.

Since this will be an all mail-in ballot election, it is important that people understand how this election will proceed. The libraries will feature "election centers" with a poster and display unit which includes an envelope sized card with information about the balloting that the folks can take with them. In addition, League members will be there in person for several days to register voters and to answer any questions about the election.

BONNIE RICHARDS FUNDRAISER

A fund raiser to support the Simaho clinic, a project started by two of our Kenyan visitors in 2007 took place at Carol West's home, Saturday July 16. The fund raiser was to honor League member Bonnie Richards who was one of the

founders of our Kenya committee, and who died recently in Green Valley. About 40 people came and bought items for sale, donated cash and brought a dish for the potluck event.

We raised almost \$1500 and with that money we will be supporting the clinic's outreach program for health services and information for nomadic women. Given the severe drought conditions in the area of

Garissa where the clinic is, near the Somali border, some money may also go into nutrition especially for pregnant women and young children who are the most vulnerable to these drought conditions. Thanks to everyone for their donations and I am sure Bonnie would have been delighted at the turnout and funds raised in her memory.

UPDATE ON REDISTRICTING CONTEST

On August 2nd, a press conference was held at the capitol to present prizes to the winners of the AZ Competitive Districts Coalition (ACDC) public mapping contest which ended July 15th. This contest was to see who could do the best job mapping, respecting the Voting Rights Act and all other criteria equally.

LWV Cochise County member Tricia Gerrodette was one of the three judges. LWVAZ President Barbara Klein oversaw the panel of judges for scheduling and arrangements. The League, with other organizations and private donors, raised the funds for the awards for the four best maps. Each winner was awarded \$500. Winners for the best Congressional map were Glen Jacques, Phoenix, AZ and Stuart Wright of Ohio. Winners for the best Legislative map were Sam Almy, Tucson, AZ and Glen Jacques, Phoenix, AZ.

Klein presented the final reports from the judges to the AZ Independent Redistricting Committee (IRC) at their August 3rd meeting.

The first round of public meetings is now over and a second round will begin in September. Check the IRC website at www.azredistricting.org to find the schedule of the meetings.

LWVGT ENDOWMENT FUND

LWVGT received the first "distribution" from our LWVGT Endowment at the Jewish Community Foundation of Southern Arizona (JCF) of \$2,697.00 (originally the Lance Endowment). This was distributed to the LWVAZ Education fund, LWVGT category. The money has to be distributed to the 501 ©3 non-profit fund and used for education purposes.

The LWVGT Board approved the Endowment Committee of Betty Bengston, Virginia Burkel, Sue DeArmond, Patsy Frannea, and Shirley Sandelands with Carol West as an ex-official member. This committee will oversee the plans for increasing the Endowment and the spending of the funds. The LWVGT Board also approved the recommended plan of allocating \$500 to Running & Winning, \$1,600 to the 2012 LWVAZ Voter Guide and \$500 to the expense of educating the members about the Endowment fund.
